SIr Paul started Surrey Border Movie Makers with a small group of friends in 1984 and the club grew from strength to strength under his careful leadership. Sir Paul loved life and lived it to the full, having only recently taken a diving holiday in the West Indies. The club he founded and loved is a great beacon of stability and fun in society, he was always first to welcome new and established members, put out the chairs and assemble the equipment. We must as

members make sure that we follow in his footsteps in these strange times and keep the club an all inclusive, friendly and welcoming organisation in the community.

In August 1984 Paul Holden put an ad in the Farnham Herald to see if there were any filmmakers interested in starting a club. Seven people, eight including Paul had their first meeting on 17th September of that year in Paul's home and resolved to start a club which they called Surrey Border Film & Video Makers.

However, Paul had started to make films from the age of 11 when his uncle gave him his old 1920's hand-turned 9.5mm PathÈscope baby ciné camera. He was still actively making films in May this year.

Paul went up to Oxford in 1941 to read chemistry, where he joined the University

Air Squadron and went solo on Tiger Moths in September 1942. Soon afterwards he left the university to join the RAF and was sent to No1 British Flying Training School in Texas to train on Stearmans and Harvards.

On return to the UK he was initially seconded to Air Traffic Control duties on the Pathfinder's airfield at RAF Wyton.

He received further flying training and was posted to No 287 Squadron at North Weald where he flew Hurricanes over London to provide a target for training anti-aircraft batteries. With the advent of the V1 flying bomb, Paul was moved onto Spitfires in 1944 and then Tempests in 1945 to provide anti-V1 training for coastal batteries by flying flat out at 500 feet above the sea directly at the guns, a task which required very accurate navigation because adjacent batteries were still 'live'.

After that Paul was lucky enough to convert to the jet-powered Meteor fighter and was posted to Colerne, where he was employed part time on flying and part time as an Air Traffic Controller.

After the war, Paul was demobbed and joined Guide Dogs for the Blind as a trainer. This is where he met Vivien. During this time he also joined the RAF Voluntary Reserve and flew Tiger Moths and Chipmunks from Exeter.

The 1948 Berlin Airlift saw Paul recalled to flying duties in the RAF where he refreshed on Harvards before flying Spitfires and Vampires.

On leaving the RAF once again, Paul returned to the Guide Dogs before becoming a Civil Air Traffic Controller, during which time he travelled the world helping to set up Air Traffic Control facilities as civil air transport spread into new territories. After that he spent his remaining career with Software Sciences involved with high-integrity real-time computing.

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During his working life what little spare time he had was spent making family movies and occasional documentaries. On a trip to India with Vivien to see the work of Lions Eye Camps, which she had raised thousands of pounds for, Paul took plenty of footage. On his return this formed the basis for four films which themselves have raised thousands for Sight Savers International. We shall be showing one of these at the July Clubnight. This particular film was instrumental in the formation of Surrey Border. It was entered into the Surrey Film Festival and on winning an award Paul was encouraged by the IAC to start a film club in the Farnham area.

In 2003 Paul became Sir Paul Holden when he became the 7th Baronet Holden, of Oakworth House, Keighley, Co. York [U.K., 1893].

In November 2004 the club celebrated its 20th anniversary and made Sir Paul our President. At BIAFF in Chesterfield on 25th April 2009 Sir Paul's contribution to amateur film making

was recognised and he was made a Fellow of the IAC, or FACI. We do not know the exact number but we suspect that he made about 80 films, and was involved in the making of many others. He has raised many hundreds of pounds towards club funds by giving film shows to 22 different organisations over the years. Since he and Vivien moved to Clare Park Residential Home he gave 32 film shows to the residents, making up a show reel each time featuring the particular season and the

people from the home. The last one was on 14th April this year.

Outside of the club he was a keen supporter of Lions and always helped at Beerfest, their main money raising event each year. Although in his 90's he still scuba dived and windsurfed, most recently in Jamaica. He reduced his involvement in choir singing to only one group. He also helped on the technical side with Newspaper for the Blind.

For the last few years when the club held its Film in an Evening exercise, Paul was always keen to head up the group with the newest members and was keen to share his knowledge along with his enthusiasm. We shall all miss Paul for his wisdom, great energy and zest for life. An example to us all.

What is a Producer? - by Rita Wheeler

One of the questions I asked when I first joined the club was "What is a Producer and what does a Producer do?" I asked several industry Producers and never got a satisfactory answer. Of course, as amateur film makers who work to a Low to No Budget, a Producer's role is slightly different from one with a commercial budget. However, since I first asked the question I have had the good fortune to work on several films where Sir Paul has been the Producer and this is what I have surmised.

Of course, this is just my opinion but for me, the Producers role is rather like a Conductor. He doesn't play an instrument but he keeps the orchestra together, bringing in different sections as and when needed and keeping the group going in the right direction. So, what comes first? The story or the crew?

First, he needs a willing crew. Then a storyline followed by a brainstorming session. Then the script. Now we're getting somewhere. Actors? Locations? Delegation. Who wants to Direct? Do the Sound? The Lighting? The Producer delegates and co-ordinates the people who know actors, who can find locations who know how to light a set, who have an eye for detail – continuity is all important. Having got his crew together, he lets them get on with the filming.

This year's theme was 'Drama Queen' and had to include a picture of the Queen and a lipstick. Simple enough.

Come in the eight strong team Weyfarers! First step, find out who's available and when. Gordon sent out a new idea - a Doodle - on which you enter all your dates and times, morning, afternoon and evening. Presented with this, it soon became clear that there were very few days when more than half of us would be around.

The first meeting opportunity was the 11 May. Meeting venue booked and all set. But Dave couldn't make it, Margaret was off on holiday until the 27 May, Neil and Gordon became stuck in heavy traffic, I became ill, Steve was late from work which left Brian and Paul, so we cancelled but too late to stop Paul who actually made it all the way from Arundel on time!

The next opportunity when a few were available was 17 May, over half the month gone and nothing done!

Neil, Gordon, Paul (he forgave us!). Brian, Steve and I made it. And a few ideas surfaced. Earlier, Brian had shot footage at the East Clandon Street Party, held to celebrate the Queen's 90th birthday. We decided that this was a great basis, especially as we'd been delayed. At the meeting Steve came up with an idea to tack onto it. But he was buried at work, so I had to write a shooting script.

I wrote a story involved the Queen arriving unannounced at the Street Party and sent it out for urgent comment. Silence! I had to move on in the meantime and started on the Props List, Equipment List and more emails flew. It seems that our group don't spend as much time in front





slow in a rather urgent situation.

Jeremy Gooding had agreed to join us for this film and I cast him as the Queen's Chauffeur. Margaret managed to receive an email from me with wifi access on a quayside in Serbia and was pleased to see that she was to play the part of the queen, rather than a murderer like last year.

responses could be painfully

I'd been rooting around for a suitably queenly limo and was rather amazed that a neighbour offered me his much loved and polished Jaguar with a white leather interior. Terrific! I took it for a try out, put my foot down gently and fired up its 4.2 litre engine - wow! Lift off! I told the troops but before we had a chance to use it, my neighbour's plans changed and he needed the car. Script rewrite.

The next date we could assemble in anything like force was Sunday 28th May which had to be our Shoot Date. No rehearsal, no tech discussion, no time.

Dave returned from holiday a few days before and Margaret arrived back only the day before. She could now read the script for the first time as she had had no connection while travelling. But she was concerned about some aspects of her role as I learned at 9.00pm the night before. Help! Dave had an idea! Script amended again at 10.30pm and I still had to get my kit together.

By 9.30am the next day, Sunday, we were gathered in East Clandon Hall, planning over a coffee. The limo was now a taxi, Jeremy's bright yellow Skoda! East Clandon, a peaceful small village, no end of cars and bikes were passing this way



and that. The road was closed in the footage we were matching to, so we had never ending retakes and false starts.

We'd shot a sequence in the front garden of a neighbour of Brian's when we noticed him on the phone asking her if we could use her garden to film in! Fortunately, she said we could. The shoot went well and the sun broke through to help match with the sunny party footage shot previously.

Movie in a Month has been condensed into two days plus emails and phone calls with three days in the editing chair and is

still as exhausting as ever!
