The October meeting of Surrey Border Movie Makers was the annual Inter-Club film competition. Reading Film & Video Makers were defending the trophy from last year; Orpington Film & Video Makers, South Downs Film Makers and Chichester Film & Video Makers made up the other clubs.

The only rule of the invitational Inter Club Competition is that no film should be longer than 20 minutes. Both Reading

KCB, and *Life's A Circus*, which showed life behind the scenes as well as circus acts.



Perhaps this article should be titled 'Brian's Nightmare' as it was he who dreamed it all up, the other fifteen of us did our best to follow in his wake.

Planned as an 'entertainment' for visitors while offering club member's filming opportunities in public view and member Vince Barnes' rock band 'Freedom From Gravity' a most unusual performance stage and a music video, this was a major undertaking. Step up Mr, O'Connell!

The 'Nightmare' story involves the band sneaking into the building while inside indoctrinated humanoids are under the control of 'The Master', a sort of Hitleresque type who has brainwashed his minions - Brian took the role.

In zombie like unison, the humanoids follow commands until the band starts to play, gradually loosening the Master's grip as the music slowly infiltrates. The Master gets his come upance and music releases those under his control.

Preliminaries: Let's wind back a little. On the 15th September, following earlier discussions, Brian and I again visited Kempton for a meeting with Peter and his colleagues, to explain the script ideas, check on access, plan preliminary layouts and get to know who would be our contacts.

Now to the 11th October and the club members' planning meeting at the Horse and Groom in Merrow when Brian outlined his ideas to the twelve attendees. Alan Brown and Gordon Sutton took on support roles and Vince Barnes was there to hear how the group would be involved.

The Filming Weekend: Saturday at 9.00am



and we had all arrived. The Museum is a great backdrop but hardly the best place for a video on an open weekend, rather a logistical nightmare! The main problem was sound as there was nothing to suppress echo in this huge void; public were on tours that took them into shot on occasion; the massive pumps were steamed up and run every half hour and all filming had to stop for the period due to noise; even during filming, there were sirens and announcements to contend with. On top of this, we were trying to get the visitors to take part when they had really just come to look round the site itself. So you might wonder how we managed.

The Turbine Floor was our stage with the lower floor access covered to provide a good operating space. Lights had been set up in advance by Peter Matthews and his colleagues - two blonds and three red heads (the lights, not the colleagues!). There were four sessions of three quarters of an hour for each day. The first fifteen minutes were for preparation, allowing about 30 minutes max for recording. After a little practice it became a pretty slick operation.

Maggie Ledwidge proved to be very effective at recruiting 'willing' participants, whisking them up to the top office before divulging fully what they had to do - good move! She then had them don their humanoid onezies (disposable decorator's overalls) and explained how they had to perform - essentially as morons!! As there were not enough visitors involved for each take, club members had to step in.

Only Bob Lambert, Alan Butcher, Alan

After learning their fate, participating extras were taken down to the set and further talked through their performance by Brian, who must have lost pounds chasing up and down between performers and crew.

Saturday started at 9.00am with a tour of the site and explanation of our aims and roles followed by a necessary caffein injection.

Before too long The Master (Brian) was up on his high vantage point booming his doctrine to the gathered humanoids (and the entire museum without any need for amplification) while they chanted in response, eyes fixed upon his all commanding, high level balcony. We then shot the Master's demise but he wasn't going without a struggle!



Later, Vince's group arrived and were initially filmed outside by Steve Michell for their undercover entry shots before setting up in the performance area for the third session, after lunch break.

A sound test with them playing a song shot recording levels off the scale and brought Kempton staff down to ask them to 'turn down the volume' as hearing aids were blowing fuses.

At reduced volume, the group gave several great performances during two sessions, repeating their song for different camera angles and shot variety. Each time, more extras were roped in to gyrate in wild

the four group members on different levels of the pump engine platforms, miming in time to their track.

Throughout, Bob Lambert, Gordon Sutton and Alan Butcher were filming while Alan Brown was calling the shots - "Run sound, roll cameras, mark it, action!" through the megaphone. In other words, the shoot was run in a professional manner for visitors.

Sunday and a late start (9.30am). Today - no music, just cut aways and additional chanting and dancing to an imaginary beat. It was busier and we soldiered on. Each time we thought we'd finished, Brian came up with 'just one more shot'! He does suit his role of The Master rather well, come to think of it.

Kathy was busy making her own film-ofthe-film. Sorry Kathy for walking into your shots! Colin Lewis was desperately trying to find a guiet place to carry out some interviews of visiting families but found the ambient sound a real problem.

With so much club effort going into the Kempton Steam Museum's Film Making Weekend, it was very rewarding to hear that the visiting public enjoyed this extra themed experience while taking in the massive scale of the Museum itself.

In traditional Hollywood style, there are many 'thank yous' but let's not bother. Our thanks were a successful event, very well prepared by The Master, Brian, and extremely well supported by us lot. Well done us!
